Pope John Paul II in *Incarnationis Mysterium*, the Bull of Indiction of the Great Jubilee of the Year 2000, wrote that every Jubilee Year is like an invitation to a wedding feast. This is your invitation and this week, you are invited to consider making a pilgrimage and gain a plenary indulgence during the Holy Year.

Pope Boniface VIII called the first Jubilee IN 1300 AD, also known as a "Holy Year," since it is a time in which God's holiness transforms us, resuming an ancient tradition which offered "abundant remission and pardon of sins" to those who visited Saint Peter's Basilica in Rome. He wished on that occasion to grant "a pardon of sins which would not only be more abundant, but more complete". From that time onwards, the Church has always celebrated Jubilees as significant steps on her journey towards the fullness of Christ.

By participating in the Holy Year, one is granted a plenary indulgence. You no longer need to travel to Rome to gain plenary indulgence as you can do your pilgrimage here in Adelaide.

What is an Indulgence?

A key feature of this Holy Year is the opportunity to gain an indulgence, part of the Catholic tradition aimed at deepening one's relationship with God and neighbour. Through an indulgence, one can be released from the temporal punishment due for sins that have already been forgiven through confession. It is an act of divine mercy, granted through the Church, that helps purify us and strengthen our commitment to a holy life. Indulgences remind us, particularly during a Jubilee Year, of God's abundant grace and call us to reconciliation and renewal.

How to Obtain a Jubilee Indulgence

To receive a plenary indulgence during the 2025 Jubilee, you must fulfill the usual conditions for a plenary indulgence:

- 1. **Sacramental Confession**: Receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation to be in a state of grace.
- 2. **Eucharistic Communion**: Participate in Mass and receive Holy Communion, ideally on the same day as the pilgrimage.
- 3. **Prayer for the Pope's Intentions**: Offer prayers, such as the Our Father, Hail Mary, or prayers of your choice, for the intentions of the Holy Father.

Interior Disposition: Commit to a heartfelt rejection of all sin, even venial sin, reflecting a desire for a genuine conversion of heart, and make a pilgrimage to a Jubilee site.

- 5. **Pilgrimage to a Jubilee Site**: Visit a designated pilgrimage site. In the Archdiocese of Adelaide, the chosen sites are:
- St. Francis Xavier's Cathedral in Adelaide
- St. Joseph's Church in Penola, celebrating the legacy of St. Mary MacKillop
- St. Aloysius' Church in Sevenhill, home to the Jesuit winery and significant religious heritage.

Those who are unable to make a pilgrimage due to illness, age, or other constraints can still receive the indulgence by spiritually uniting themselves to the Jubilee celebrations through prayer and acts of charity.

Why Participate in a Jubilee Pilgrimage?

Pilgrimages are powerful acts of faith, symbolising our journey toward God. Visiting one of Adelaide's Jubilee sites allows for a profound encounter with Christ. St. Francis Xavier's Cathedral, as a spiritual heart of the archdiocese, invites worshippers to reflect on God's mercy. St. Joseph in Penola connects pilgrims to the courage and faith of St. Mary MacKillop, a pioneer of Catholic education in Australia. St. Aloysius in Sevenhill offers a peaceful setting to contemplate the Jesuit mission and the beauty of creation. Whether walking through the Holy Door, praying for the intentions of others, or performing works of mercy, each act brings us closer to God and strengthens our hope in His promises.

Let this Jubilee Year be a time of grace for us all in the Archdiocese of Adelaide.

One may have the gift of preaching with wisdom given him by the Spirit; another may have the gift of preaching instruction given him by the same Spirit; and another the gift of faith given by the same Spirit; another again the gift of healing, through this one Spirit; one, the power of miracles; another, prophecy; another the gift of recognising spirits; another the gift of tongues and another the ability to interpret them. All

these are the work of one and the same Spirit, who distributes different gifts to different people just as he chooses.

GOSPEL John 2:1-11

There was a wedding at Cana in Galilee. The mother of Jesus was there, and Jesus and his disciples had also been invited. When they ran out of wine, since the wine provided for the wedding was all finished, the mother of Jesus said to him, 'They have no wine.' Jesus said, 'Woman, why turn to me? My hour has not come yet.' His mother said to the servants, 'Do whatever he tells you.' There were six stone water jars standing there, meant for the ablutions that are customary among the Jews: each could hold twenty or thirty gallons. Jesus said to the servants, 'Fill the jars with water,' and they filled them to the brim. 'Draw some out now,' he told them, 'and take it to the steward.' They did this; the steward tasted the water, and it had turned into wine. Having no idea where it came from - only the servants who had drawn the water knew - the steward called the bridegroom and said, 'People generally serve the best wine first, and keep the cheaper sort till the guests have had plenty to drink; but you have kept the best wine till now.'

This was the first of the signs given by Jesus: it was given at Cana in Galilee. He let his glory be seen, and his disciples believed in him.
